Perhaps one of First City's most valued contributions to this year's United Way/Capital Area campaign was the support given to their "Loaned Executive Program."



Keeping fit in winter means three things, say the experts: (1) maintaining muscle tone and flexibility, (2) retaining good cardiovascular health, and (3) keeping off extra weight that tends to build up in winter.

Even cardiovascular health — the crucial part of fitness — can be maintained in winter with a little effort.

Studies show that although a total of two hours per week of strenuous exercise — for at least nine months, on the average — is needed to build good cardiovascular fitness, as little as 45 minutes per week will be enough to maintain it. Your cardio-maintenance program could be three 15-minute sessions of jogging or indoor exercises.

Keeping fit without equipment is not a complicated matter. And an expensive health club isn't really needed either. You can start with morning calisthenics, but be out of bed and warmed up for at least ten minutes before doing even the simplest exercises. Our winter prescription: five minutes

of simple stretching exercises — morning and evening — to maintain flexibility and relax your muscles.

Pushups or running in place are two ways to raise the heart rate to the 110 to 120 range without using equipment.

Do them for five minutes morning and night. A jump rope is another good idea, not much of an investment. If you live in an apartment with neighbors below, however, it might not be the best thing.

A calorie is a calorie, winter or summer. Keep an eye on the scale during less-active months when weight is more likely to build up. Generally, it is recommended to eat fewer calories a day than you would during summer.

Aerobic exercise for 15 minutes three times a week will maintain cardiovascular fitness. This means raising your pulse rate 70 to 85 percent of your maximum and keeping it there for 15 minutes. (To calculate maximum pulse rate, subtract your age from 220.)

# Department in the News =

You basically know that the representatives in New Accounts open checking and savings accounts, but do you realize just how important this area is? These individuals are a lot of times the first people prospective customers come in contact with, thus making a first and lasting impression of our bank.

Today, the people in New Accounts are known as financial counselors who are responsible for opening new accounts as well as cross selling other bank services. Each individual is trained to assist in the operation of the Check Order Department, an area they all work in on a revolving basis. They also take turns serving as the bank's official "greeter" at the Information Desk.

Today's banking services have expanded drastically, and along with this expansion comes new challenges. One of these new challenges, which is a result of the Interest in Dividend Tax Compliance Act of 1983, is the processing of W-9 forms. Every account must reflect a social security number, a number that must be verified by the customer. First City has over 60,000 checking and savings accounts that will have to be file maintenanced. This processing will be funneled through the New Accounts area.

# Meet the individuals who make up this area. . .

Cheryl Hunter, lobby services supervisor, has been with us for five years. She joined our bank in 1978 as a teller, and in 1980 she joined the New Accounts area as a representative. In 1981 she transferred to First City Bank-Windsor Park in San Antonio. She rejoined us in 1982, and in October of this year she was promoted to lobby services supervisor. Today she is responsible for the lobby tellers and the New Accounts area.

### **Financial Counselors**

Jackie Gordon joined our bank in October. She came to us from First City Bank-Westheimer in Houston, Texas. Jackie has received diplomas for completion of the Basic and Intermediate Schools of Banking and the Lending School through the American Institute of Banking. She has also completed numerous other AIB courses.

case of an emergency


