The crowd seemed pleased to have a means of visiting with a variety of human service agencies as well as each agency having a way of providing information about their agency to a number of people.





Keeping It Safe...

If you're not aware of it already, there is someone looking out for your safety as well as the safety of our customers. That someone is John Pope, director of security. Mr. Pope served for over 30 years as sergeant of forgery with the Austin Police Department, and it was after his retirement that he decided on a new career with First City. Since joining the bank in 1981, his major focus has been "beefing up" security measures for the bank. When he came on board, we had one security guard and now we have twelve. With an exceptional security crew that includes Ray Clark, captain, Bob Long, lieutenant, Harry Knapp, Gayle Wilkinson, Paul Dextraze, Gary Foster, Robert Aderhold, James Rice, Pat Hurley, Carol Stephens, Salvador Castro, and Pat Collier, we are under the watchful eyes of security officers 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Right now our bank is going through some security changes, and the precautions being taken have our best interests in mind. The Security Department is well equipped with the most up-to-date equipment . . . from the identification and finger-printing machines, card reading systems which are being installed throughout the bank that require a verification card for access, and roving cameras, to the Diebold MPS

1020 that displays all alarms throughout the bank. Mr. Pope feels confident that the new surveillance equipment and the presence of security officers will deter somebody from doing harm to us or the bank.

It is anticipated that on October 1, the Ninth Street entrance to the bank will be accessable only by use of a verification card during the hours of 9:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m., Monday - Friday, and on Saturday, Sunday, and holidays.

- Oxygen emergency inhalators are located in the stairway of the bank on the following floors: Plaza, 3rd, 6th, 9th, 12th, and 15th (First City Bank building); 9th and 10th (First City Centre); and at both east and west drive-thru locations.

"We need everyone's cooperation. If you see something out of the ordinary, we would appreciate your giving us a call," commented Mr. Pope. "We are the police of the bank, and we will deal with any problem that arises and assist anybody, anytime."

In June of 1984 a new department was created ... Systems Coordination. It is located on the second floor (old Loan Review offices) opposite the Officers' Dining Room. This area was formed for the purpose of serving as liaison between the lending staff and the Data Processing Department for the AFS Commercial Lending System. They provide support training on all of First City's computer systems and help develop smaller programs for the microcomputers. CIF, which has the responsibility of maintaining complete customer profiles for lenders, is now a part of Systems Coordination.

Systems Coordination reports to the Loan Administration Division headed by Harold Page, senior vice president.

Peggy Foreman is the systems coordinator and manager. Peggy has been with our bank since January of 1983 when she began training in Credit Analysis. Peggy holds a BBA in finance and a BBA in data processing from The University of Texas.
