On May 15, 1985, the Austin Chamber of Commerce hosted the Adopt-A-School Salute to the Austin Independent School District. The evening paid tribute to many outstanding examples of excellence in our public school system, which included the recognition of National Merit Scholarship Finalists, National Achievement Scholars, and the Austin Teacher of the Year, Larry Waterhouse, president of the Austin School Board of Trustees introduced several categories of Adopt-A-School partners who had distinguished themselves during the past 18 months of the program, and the top award, "A+ Partner of the Year," was awarded to John C. Scurlock and First City National Bank of Austin. 

Houston, Texas, May 9, 1985 — "The recession in energy has been difficult," senior chairman James A. Elkins, Jr. told shareholders of First City Bancorporation at their annual meeting today, "but we feel we have an excellent grasp of our situation and are coming through the turbulence without impairing our ranking as one of the most strongly capitalized banking companies in America."

"We're bearing down on what we can control today. We aren't standing idly by. And we're taking a longer view — defining our mission for the next five years," Mr. Elkins said.

"Energy problems aren't over yet. But better days lie ahead."

President Daniel C. Arnold said that energy weakness has pushed problem loans over the \$500 million mark — or more than 4 percent of total loans. "Net earnings have totaled \$131 million in the past two years, but the energy recession has cut our full earning power sharply."

He added, however, that "the Texas economy is more diverse than ever, and the Texas population has increased faster than any other state's the past five years." He also said that unit banking in Texas is probably the most cost-effec-

tive system in the country for delivering financial services.

"First City has 63 banks in every major market in this strong state. We've diversified our asset base and deposits. Energy loans now represent 21 percent of total loans — down from the peak of 26 percent in 1982. Income from nonlending services has grown at a compound annual rate of 25 percent the past five years."

Mr. Arnold reported that First City in 1984 had the highest ratio of primary capital to assets among the top 25 U.S. banking companies. It also led the five major Texas banking companies in net interest margin and in the lowest exposure to real estate loans as a percentage of total loans.

"It's true that we have significant energy problems resulting in large loan losses," Mr. Arnold said. "But we have strengthened our internal procedures for improving asset quality and reducing expenses. We have management teams working on enhancing revenues. And our financial foundation is not only quite secure, but is capable of supporting new growth in future years."

Mr. Arnold reported on a management effort to re-define the corporate mission for the next five years. The company, he said, will concentrate on seven core businesses in the years ahead:

- Wholesale banking
- Consumer banking
- Small-business banking
- Correspondent banking
- Trust
- Public and not-for-profit entities
- · Financial advisory services

He stated that the company continues to be a leader in the Southwest and the country in banking technology. He said that the ability to innovate in a more balanced mix of markets in the growing Texas economy "speaks loudly about the promise we have in getting our problems behind us and getting on with our mission."

Mr. Elkins announced the election of 31 directors to the board of First City Bancorporation, which included the reelection of **John S. Burns**, chairman of the executive committee of First City National Bank of Austin.
